One of the strengths of phenomenology has been the way it moves between the particular and the general, but, as Ortega points out, even existential phenomenological accounts “that profess to do justice to lived experience avoid personal descriptions informed by particular social identities, staying within the confines of general categories of existence.”¹ To stay within such general categories not only fails to provide for the kinds of thick phenomenological accounts that enrich our understanding of the particularities of lived experience, but also of the generalities that allow us to understand more clearly what it means to be existentially human. Indeed, attending to thick descriptions of lived existence has led Ortega to extend phenomenological categories and understanding at the level of generality, providing us with her important concepts of living in-between worlds, and in particular of multiple-selves. But what Ortega accomplishes here is even more profound. In developing her concept of the multi-

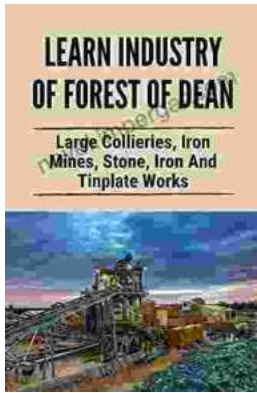


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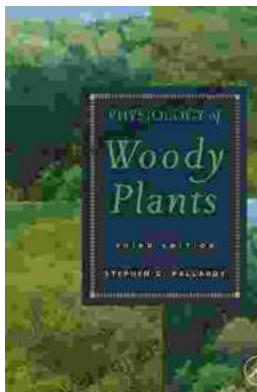
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
