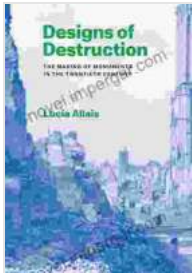

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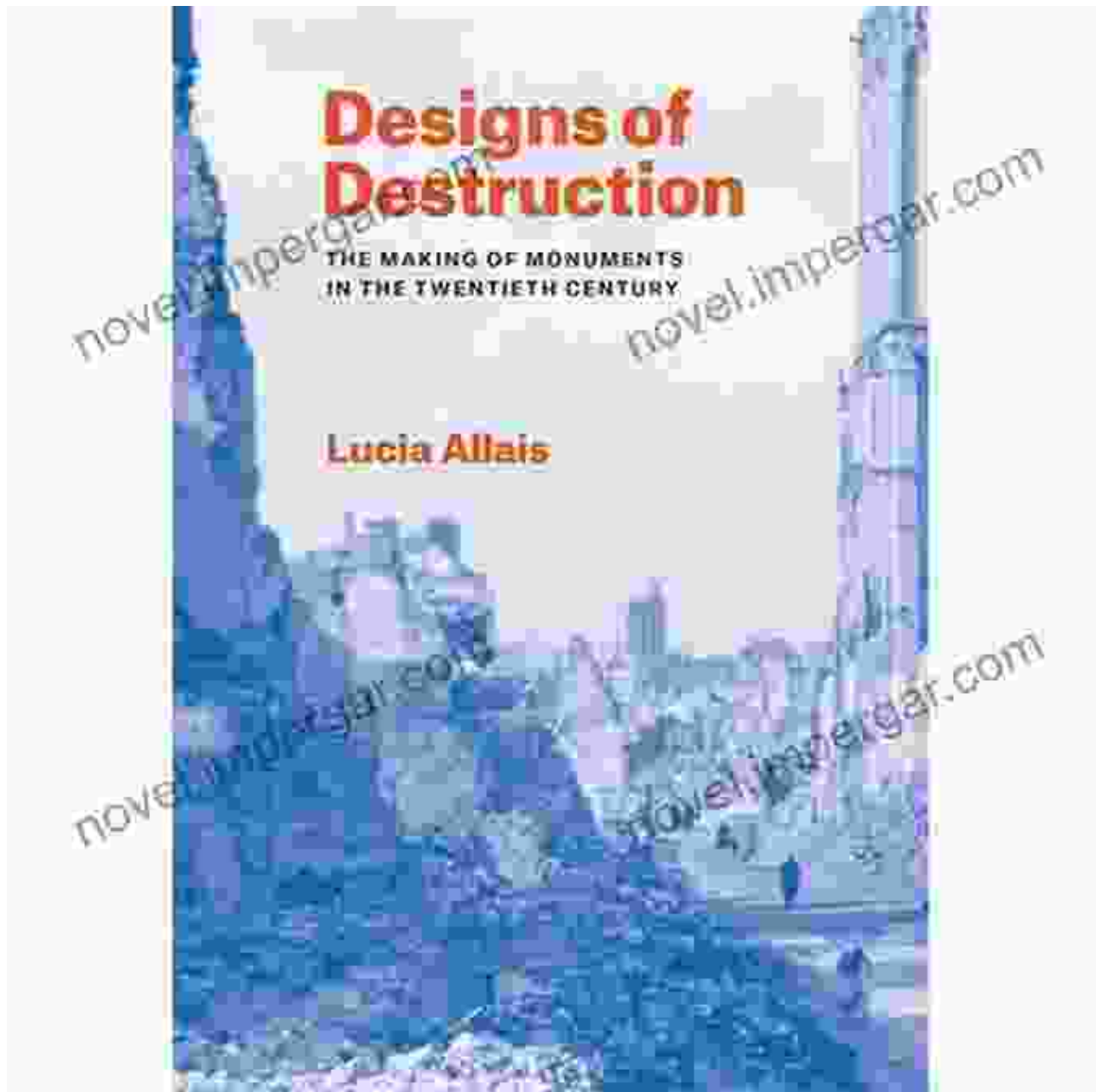

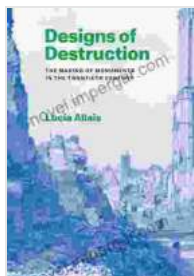
The Gateway Arch in St. Louis, Missouri, designed by Eero Saarinen.

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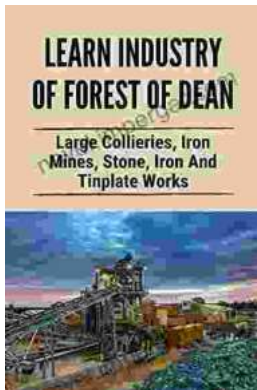
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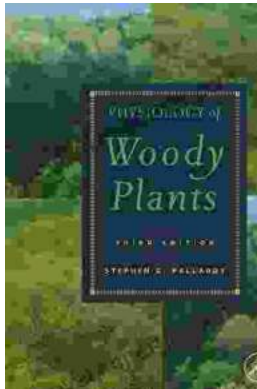
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
